HELPING YOUR STUDENT WITH THE N-400 APPLICATION

- "I love the United States."
- "I love living here."
- "I want to vote."

These are just some of the reasons eligible clients offer when asked why they have decided to apply for citizenship. Since 2013, Literacy Nassau has been able to offer Advanced-level ESOL classes, free legal services, and assistance completing the N-400 application, thanks to a grant from the NYS Office for New Americans. This funding allows us to provide all of these services through our office, which is one of 28 state-wide Opportunity Centers. Since 2013, we have worked with over 300 clients to complete their citizenship applications, green card renewals and family-based petitions. Our goal is to continue helping those who are interested in becoming citizens so that they can vote, obtain better jobs, and continue to grow as active members of their communities.

This is where you come in. As you work with your students on improving their English skills, they might ask you immigration-based questions that you don't know the answers to. Politically, immigration is a hot topic, and many of our students may be struggling to find answers and information to keep themselves and members of their family safe. As a Board of Immigration Appeals (BIA) accredited center, Literacy Nassau can offer the help your students need. In addition to completing N-400 applications and petitions, we also provide free citizenship classes taught by a few of our wonderful volunteers and workshops presented by United States Immigration & Citizenship Services (USCIS), the government entity that oversees lawful immigration in the United States.

If you or your student have a question about eligibility for naturalization or any immigration related question, please contact our office at (516)-867-3580 and speak to Umama Pasha (extension 17) or Karen Micciche (extension 11). Also, if your student is ready to file the N-400 application, please call us. We are happy to take that burden off your hands and can complete the application with your student, usually in a single session. We will make an appointment with you and/or your learner at your local library or at our office in Freeport.

LITERACY FOR ALL

When I first put feelers out to locate a child with dyslexia for my Orton-Gillingham (OG) practicum, I was shocked by the immediate response that I received. Within a few hours, at least a dozen parents desperately reached out to me for reading help for their children.

My first practicum was with a 76 year-old veteran and now I have the pleasure of working with a creative and smart eight-year old girl, Molly. She is dyslexic and in third grade but reading on a kindergarten level. Dyslexia is heredity and she has three cousins who also share her struggle.


It has been fun thinking back to when I taught elementary school and I have been able to use some old strategies from my classroom days and incorporate many new strategies that I have been learning in my OG coursework. To help Molly stay focused on each word, I have her put a cute topper on her pencil to point to each word as she reads them. She uses a Snapple bottle cap to tap out the sounds in new words. I have used a bag of glittery slime as a multisensory tool for her to learn how to properly form new cursive letters. She races a small car parallel to sentences to read with more fluency and automaticity.

Molly has allowed me to develop and explore my own creativity in this new venture in working with children. In the not-too-distant future, Literacy Nassau will have the opportunity to help entire families, both parents and children, by providing literacy for all.

RESOURCE CENTER: PROBLEM SOLVING

When an experienced teacher and tutor tells me about a great resource they use, I listen! Problem Solving: Critical Thinking and Communication Skills was recently shared with me by one of our tutors, and I'm happy to share it with you. If you have students who are ready for some critical thinking and conversation, this is a book for you. It presents individual 'problems' that are extremely relatable for adult ESOL students. For instance, one



problem finds a young man, who recently arrived in the United States, feeling lonely and wondering how to go about meeting people. There is a brief set-up of the problem offered as both a story and a picture. Then, there are corresponding exercises that go with the story, ranging from reading comprehension to writing. Additionally, there are a number of inference-based questions that go beyond the story, encouraging the students to discuss how the concepts presented in the story relate to their own lives. If you are looking for a way to get your students talking, and are seeking out topics that are universally engaging, give this book a try. You won't be disappointed! (Please note: You can buy the book on Amazon; it retails for about \$16. You can also check with your local library to see if they have a copy.)

Why did you volunteer with Literacy Nassau when there are many other volunteer opportunities you could have pursued? Literacy Nassau helps many people get more opportunities in this country. As an immigrant myself; I understand the difficulties people have in order to succeed. Learning English is vital tool in this country.

Explain your experience throughout these past years with us.

I have learned many new techniques teaching adults. Adults tend to be very eager to learn the language and have the motivation to succeed in life.

What would you advise a new tutor who is just starting out with us?

Remember helping other people is a satisfaction, not a responsibility that you are forced to take on. I believe tutors should enjoy helping others. Your student will see your passion, which will motivate them. Tell us about your current student. How are things going?

My student, Emelina, maintains a balance between learning and family responsibilities. At times it may feel difficult or overwhelming but she is eager to open more doors to opportunity for herself and her family. What motivates you to keep on tutoring with us?

Literacy Nassau is a great program that provides the training and support that any tutor might need, including teaching materials, lesson ideas, etc. Thanks to their support I am personally motivated to see where my student can go in her language learning journey.

We are thrilled to share that we received two very large grants this past month: \$35,000 from the Guru Krupa Foundation, and \$50,000 from the RTS Family Foundation.

As you may know, the Guru Krupa Foundation enabled us to launch an internship program this year. The success of the program included not only the extra sets of hands to help out as Office Assistants here at Literacy Nassau, but also included connecting interns with meaningful workshops to improve their employability in America. To date, six interns have completed the program and our newest class of four more have been working with us since September.
