

OG TUTORS AND STUDENTS AT 2019 RECOGNITION NIGHT



BASIC LITERACY TUTOR OF THE YEAR WINNER

At this year's Recognition Night, I had the pleasure of presenting the BL Tutor of the Year Award to Mara Jacobowitz. Mara has been a tutor with Literacy Nassau for the past several years. She has been working 1:1 with Basic Literacy Students, individualizing their instruction and helping them to improve their reading and meet their goals. She is very dedicated in finding materials of unique interest to each of her students and in assigning homework and follow-up assignments to further improve their skills. Her students have shown tremendous growth.

This past year, as we began transitioning our Basic Literacy program from 1:1 into a small group model and started incorporating procedures from Orton Gillingham, we asked Mara if she would be willing to take this new training and take on a small group of students. We were delighted that she accepted. In addition to working with her previous 1:1 student, Mara began working with a new BL small group. She introduced the ladies in her group to a new method of instruction that they had not seen before. Her students reported making several attempts at learning to read in the past without success, but once they began working with her, they finally understood what it was all about. They were delighted to have grown so much this past year that they were able to include their written work in Open Door.

We are thankful for Mara's continued dedication to the students of Literacy Nassau and look forward to working with her again next year.

If you would like to follow in Mara's footsteps, we are in need of a few more Basic Literacy Tutors for small group instruction. BL groups have about 3-5 English speaking students who are reading below the 6th grade level. You will be trained in an introduction to Orton Gillingham procedures and provided with a curriculum and materials for the group to use. Groups meet in local libraries twice a week for 1 ½ hours. Once groups are matched, they will stay together permanently. As new students enroll, they will be added to ongoing groups that have available space.
